specific information. These reading methods make it easier for you to grasp a large amount of material, especially when you are previewing. They are also useful when you don't need to know every word. 1- Skimming: a. Definition b. Examples: newspapers, magazines, Business and travel brochures... a. How to skim? 2- Scanning: a. Definition b. Examples: Flights time tables, Google search list, a graph, a bus schedule, a conference guide... c. How to scan? **Practice** Conclusion 3- Detailed a. Definition b. Examples: a notice, a recipe .... — First test: Pulp Fiction.

♥ Seven Strategies To Teach Students
Text Comprehension
1- Monitoring Comprehension
— Be aware of what they do
understand
— Identify what they do not
understand
— Use appropriate strategies to
resolve problems in
comprehension
2- Metacognition
— Identify where the difficulty occurs
— Identify what the difficulty is
— Restate the difficult sentence or
passage in their own words
— Look back through the text

— Look forward in the text for
information that might help them to
resolve the difficulty
3- Graphic and Semantic Organizers
— Venn Diagrams
— Story Board /Chain of Events
— Story Map
— Cause /Effect
4- Answering Questions
— Give students a purpose for reading
— Focus student's to think actively as
they read
— Help students to think actively as
they read
— Encourage students to monitor their
comprehension
— Help students to review content and
relate what they have learned to what
they already know.
